Phil's Thoughts

Falling on March 27, Easter is early this year (the earliest it can be is March 22), and this means Lent, the 40 day season of preparation before Easter, begins **February 10** (Ash Wednesday)!

As has been our church's tradition, we will hold a **Wednesday 6:30 p.m. study during Lent**. We begin on the 10th with a brief Ash Wednesday worship service followed by our first study session.

This year, our study guide will be Brian McLaren's book, *A New Kind of Christianity: Ten Questions that are Transforming the Faith*. McLaren is a former pastor and prolific author. His work appeals to a diverse array of Christians, and those considering Christianity. He is a clear and creative articulator of vibrant and vital faith, and his writings give expression to a life of integrity, purpose, social justice, and personal commitment.

The ten questions McLaren poses for A New Kind of Christianity are:

1. What is the Biblical Narrative?
2. How is the Bible Authoritative?
3. Is God Violent?
4. Who is Jesus?
5. What do we do with the Church?
6. What is the Gospel?
7. Can we talk about human sexuality without it dividing us?
8. How do we view the Future?
9. What about other Religions?
10. So what do we do/what Actions do we take?

McLaren's thesis is grounded in his approach to scripture. During the study, we will explore the Bible questions and then decide as a group which additional questions to consider. If there is interest, we will continue after Easter, and perhaps add additional questions to the list.

I hope you can participate in this study that can be a valuable part of your Lenten

journey. You can pick up a copy of the book at church, and it is also available in e-book formats.

If you are interested in the study, but unavailable on Wednesday nights, please let me know. I am happy to talk with you about scheduling a second session at a different time.

May Lent be for all of us a season of spiritual exploration and faithful questioning that will better prepare us for the living of our days.

The Annual Meeting of NLUC was held after church on Sunday, January 31, 2016. Everyone enjoyed great food with many dishes prepared by members of the congregation. The Middle School Sunday School class prepared homemade muffins for the potluck. The Men's Prayer Breakfast set up the tables, and the Middle School class helped with the tablecloths, napkins, and silverware. Thanks go to Judy Knight for coordinating the meal arrangements.

Corey Schlosser-Hall, the Executive Presbyter of the Northwest Coast Presbytery called the meeting to order and brought greetings from the Presbyterian congregations in the Northwest. Corey announced that our presbytery is now being joined by additional churches in Central Washington.

Phil presented on behalf of United Methodist Conference Superintendent Carlo Rapanut, outlining Carlo's six passions for the work of the Alaska UMC: Engagement; Welcoming; Discipling; Risk-

taking; Connection; and Calling.

In his pastor's report, Phil gave special thanks to all those who gave extra effort last February when he was South for surgery and recovery. He also noted that our worship attendance has dipped a bit and he recalled the counsel of our late Pastor Emeritus, Dr. Walter Soboleff, who would remind everyone that they can invite others to church.

Treasurer Jim Alter gave the financial report via the phone from Maui, and thanked the congregation for its amazing generosity. In addition to a fully supporting the core budget, the congregation contributed nearly \$130,000 for community and global outreach such as the Front Street Clinic and Refugee Resettlement. Judy Knight gave thanks for Jim's wise and thorough oversight of the congregation's finances.

Natalie Powers prepared a PowerPoint presentation of the Visioning Work Plan that was developed by the congrega-

tion in 2014 and that continues to provide effective guidance for our many ministries.

January's Operation Giving Above-Budget

Congregational giving In support of Northern Light's day-to-day budget began 2016 strongly. The total amount given during January was about 8%, or \$2,000, above what the adopted 2016 budget had assumed it to be. Thanks to everyone who contributed to this vigorous start in our year's giving.

January is obviously only 1/12 of the total budget year. Thus, conclusions about how the whole year will go are premature. Nevertheless, it's better to

be "ahead of schedule" after the first month than "behind".

Being ahead of budget indicates that the congregation's giving mode is affirming. This, in turn, reassures the church Council and other church leaders that the funding they had anticipated (when adopting the budget in December) being present for this year's programmatic activities will, in fact, be there.

Northern Light's "day-to-

day" budget is its "Operational" Budget. 80% of its revenue comes from congregational giving. These gifts and the other 20% of the budget's revenue pay for Northern Light's routine expenses, such as staff, utilities, supplies, maintenance and repairs. Designated gifts for specific programs, especially those run under the auspices of an organization different than Northern Light, are (100%) forwarded to the specified program.

Dinner at the Glory Hole

One of the ongoing ways Northern Light shares at the Glory Hole, Juneau's emergency shelter and soup kitchen, is **providing the evening meal on the third and fourth Tuesdays** of each month. The third Tuesday menu is chili and spaghetti is served on the fourth Tuesday. Many members and friends participate in this effort by shopping for food, donating funds, cooking, serving the meals, and sharing fellowship with Glory Hole patrons.

Here's how it works:

The Sunday before each meal, a sign-up sheet for

food, cooks and servers is posted on the church information bulletin board in the Fellowship Hall. Food marked "Glory Hole" can be left in the church kitchen/ refrigerator or taken to the Glory Hole kitchen by 3:30 p.m. the day of the meal (food costs can be a donation or reimbursed by the church office).

The **cooking crew** (usually three to five folks) **begins preparation at the Glory Hole at 4:00 p.m.** and **Dinner is served at 6:00.** The servers can then share the meal with others eating at the Glory Hole. Many in

our congregation provide faithful help and are always eager to share this experience with new volunteers. There is always someone there who has done it before and knows the ropes.
